Civic Engagement Bingo

Directions: Go around the room and ask participants if a box describes them. If they say “yes”, mark that person’s name in that box. You may only ask each person one question at a time. If you have asked all participants a question, you may ask everyone a second question. The first person to get 5 squares in a row vertically, horizontally, or diagonally calls out “Bingo!” and wins the game.
